La FLOR, NICARAGUA

A team from the Just Hope Program took a mission trip to La Flor Nicaragua March 12-18, 2016. The team from the Philo Church were: A.J. There are 55 families living atop one of the mountains in the rainforest where there is no electricity, water, or health and social services. It costs about \$1,000 a year for a child to attend school, but most of them drop out after the sixth grade because they can't afford high school. The most important thing the residents want to do is to send their children to high school. Over 70 books were donated to the school. PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI

Focusing on Ministry and Mission to Children

Submitted by RE Janet C. Procter, Golconda, First Golconda First just completed another school year of PresbyKids on May 17, 2016. This one day a week after-school program originally was intended for kids 5-10, but this year expanded to include two different groups. The children from PreK through Second Grade met at the church building, and the 3rd through 5th graders met at the manse. Children are encouraged to include friends who may go to other churches or not attend a church. Arrangements have been made for parents to be able to request transport on the same school bus on the day of the meeting, and adult leaders meet the school bus at the stop nearest the church and walk them to the church and then with older students on to the manse. Each week, as parents and grandparents come to pick up the children there is time for some interactions with the adult leaders to share what the children have been learning. In addition, since the younger group includes non-readers, at the end of the year each child was sent home with a picture summary of the 8 different Bible stories studied. The children also took part in a special Christmas program and the Maundy Thursday Service.

This group of children have energized us to offer Vacation Bible School the last two summers. Before this, the church joined with the Methodist Church in Golconda to assist in their VBS. Now children can attend both theirs and ours. In 2014, the children traveled with Paul in our VBS, and last year they escaped from Egypt with Moses. This summer, they will be back in Egypt with Joseph. Last summer 34 different children attended, and 15 different adults and older teens helped.

As part of its mission to the community, First Presbyterian of Golconda also continued to provide weekend snack bags for children in grades K through 5 in families where their school lunches are subsidized. The church decided to target these children of the "working poor" when the program began midyear 4 years ago. The school tells us how many bags should be prepared without revealing names of the children, and church members bring the recommended food items. Five different volunteer coordinators have organized the program, and volunteers from ages 3 to 92 have helped fill the bags on Sunday mornings. One couple has taken the bags to school each week where the school then labels them and on Friday afternoons puts them in the children's backpacks to go home. The number of bags per week has varied from 37 to 47 during the life of the program, and when a teacher has made a special request to the school coordinator, another bag has been added.

Last year, we received one of the Presbytery's Mission Grants, and funds were used to send summer food boxes to the families served by the weekend program. This spring, the cash donations from congregants for the weekend program have accumulated to help us meet the need for summer food boxes identified through a survey of program participants. So the Mission Grant bump-started an expansion of this already existing mission of the church.

Historic Church to Preserve Stained Glass

KANSAS — The tiny congregation of the historic Kansas Presbyterian Church is hoping to raise enough money to install storm window protection on the building's stained glass windows.

The building, constructed in 1909 and dedicated on Nov. 28 of that same year, is home to "the church that will not die," according to John S. Morris, the layspeaker for the congregation that meets twice a month.

Morris, whose family has attended the church for generations, said the larger windows for the church are protected by exterior glass. 'The storm windows protect these heavy leaded glass windows from the elements and other damage," he said.

The congregation's most recent project was to install the glass protective windows on the bottom tier of stained glass windows. These rectangular windows are now all protected, Morris said.

"The bigger job is to cover and protect the 25 windows on the second story," Morris explained. These windows, he noted, include windows that are arched as well as circles. "They are much more expensive to cover," he said.

The cost for the glass alone — without labor — is well above \$20,000. "We've raised about \$4,000, so we're a long way from making this project happen," he said.

Since one of the arched windows on the second floor imploded — and with the hail storms that have moved through the area this spring and summer — the project has taken on a greater urgency.

The congregation "hit a few rough spots" in the last couple of years with attendance on the first and third Sundays of the month dropping to two or three people.

Recently, however, attendance has improved with 21 in church during the most recent service, he said. "We're now averaging about 19-21 a Sunday when we meet," he said.

According to Morris, longtime members has reported at its peak the church had about 40 members. The Sunday School room, just south of the sanctuary, is used for in the winter months to cut down the cost of heating the entire building, he said.

The church is able to continue thanks to CIPS/Ameren stock left to the congregation by the estate of the late F.B. Weaver, a longtime member and local physician. "The dividends from the stock make it possible for this church to continue," Morris said.

But the dividends aren't enough to cover the repair and preservation of the windows, he said.

Richard Taylor of Glass FX, a specialty company in Champaign, cleaned and restored the windows a couple of years ago, Morris noted.

"He came in and erected scaffolding and cleaned and stabilized the windows. He was very meticulous," Morris said. Taylor told Morris the church once burned coal for heat because he found a buildup of coal dust inside the windows.

Taylor noticed the square American flag window at the entrance of the church had a small hole where a BB had been shot through it.

"He said he walked by the window every day and finally had to do something," Morris explained. Taylor told Morris "this one's on me." "I defy you to find the pane of glass that was repaired," he said.

Extraordinary projects and repairs are tough for the small congregation to manage, Morris admitted.

"We're hoping people — not just in Kansas — who recognize the importance of this church to help us raise the money to protect the windows," he said.

The congregation has been trying to space out the projects so money could be raised, Morris noted.

The church building is unique in the county, he said, in that it looks more like a temple than a Midwestern country church. "There's not a bell in town or spire."

Morris praised those members who have served as the church's treasurers in the past. "They have protected the assets of the church like the money was their own."
